Notes from the Journey . . . “Don’t be afraid. Be a Christian”

“Don’t be afraid. Be a Christian.” Those were the words of woman I met this morning: Marion Wright Edelman.

Growing up in Mississippi in the 1940s, Marion saw how poor the families were, how hungry the children were, how many of them did not go to school because they didn’t have clothes, or shoes, or they were needed at home. She saw that children couldn’t vote, or advocate for themselves, so she studied law and became the first African-American woman to pass the bar exam in the state of Mississippi. She started “The Children’s Defense Fund,” to advocate for poor children not only in the deep south, but everywhere in America.



“In Columbus,” she told us, “1/3 of your children live in poverty. In Cincinnati, it’s 51%, in Cleveland, it’s 53%.” . Last year, and the year before, and the year before that, twice as many pre-school children died from gunshots as did police officers. These children experience a toxic level of stress, akin to that soldiers encounter in war zones. It impairs their body and mind, and can defeat their spirit. “If we don’t stand up for children, we don’t stand for much as a nation, as Christians.”

For her work, Marion Wright Edelman has won many awards, including the most prestigious honor the country gives: the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Marion was here at our United Methodist Conference office to address those of us connected to the Freedom School Movement. She spoke of the importance of working with pre-school children, which is the focus in our 5-week summer Kindergarten readiness program, “A Good Start.” Our name comes from something Marion once said: “Every child deserves a good start.”

Charity and I are starting to gear up for the summer. We will be looking for teachers and helpers, volunteers and staff. We will be sending one of our young people off for training at Marion’s farm in Tennessee, where they will meet other young people committed to transforming the lives of children and through them, the nation. Then in early June, we will be going into homes of our poorest neighbors and inviting their children to come to our church for a summer of learning. It is costly, and time-consuming, and a bit overwhelming.

“Don’t be afraid, be a Christian.” Amen to that.

Dear Friends,

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! I have waited for a long time to write this letter. Today was our final day of service for 2013. Words cannot express the value of your time, efforts, prayers, and talents that you have all given to our neighbors.

In 2012 we served 2,904 families; in 2013 we served 4,044 families! We had an increase of 39.3% in 2013!!! This does not include the families that we helped with Back to School and Christmas

adoptions. This is solely for the pantry and the food that we distributed.

Thank you again for all of your hard work and efforts. 2014 promises to be another challenging year; I would anticipate another increase again this year. We start again on Monday, January 6, 2014, at 9 a.m.!



Peace!

The church has always historically played an important role in struggles for freedom, justice and reconciliation between people. United Methodists struggled to overcome Jim Crow segregation in the United States and the Apartheid in South Africa by providing us with the moral justification to work for a world without separateness, oppression, domination, and dispossession. Our small Justice and Peace for Palestine group decides to be SUMUD (Arabic, meaning steadfast) in our call to study the situation in Israel and Palestine and how we might support our church in an ethical struggle for a genuine and lasting peace.



The Palestine Study group will continue with our monthly meetings by screening the new documentary, ***The Stones Cry Out, The Story of the Palestinian Christians (2013, 56 minutes)***, a film by Yasmine Perni. Christianity was born in Palestine two thousand years ago. From there it spread throughout the Middle East and to the rest of the world. Many people are unaware Christians still live in the land. For more than 60 years the Palestinians, Christians, and Muslims have suffered displacement, expulsion, wars, occupation, and oppression. The voices of Palestinian Christians have all too often been drowned out in

the turmoil of events. This documentary is their story, in their voices, from the Nakba (catastrophe) of 1948 until today.

For our Lenten study this year, we will be using a study guide called *Zionism Unsettled, A Congregational Study Guide*. This resource is a project of the Israel/Palestine Mission Network of the Presbyterian Church (USA, theIPMN.org). This study examines the role of Jewish and Christian forms of Zionism in providing theological and ideological “cover” for the takeover of Palestinian land, and the domination and dispossession of the Palestinian people during the past one and a quarter centuries.

If you are interested in learning more about this subject or joining in the Lenten study group, order the booklet and DVD for \$10.

The Palestine study group meets the fourth Friday of each month at 7 p.m. in the parlor. Snacks are provided or you can bring something to share.

The Lenten study dates have not been set yet but will in the bulletin and next newsletter when it is set. Join us!

Supplies for the Homeless (LOAM)

The Love One Another Ministries (LOAM) has been keeping close watch on those homeless at encampments in the city. They have provided heaters and propane, blankets, and candles just in the past month.

Like those clients visiting NSI, the homeless biggest need is food. Canned goods, easy open cans with a tab, are needed: tuna, Vienna sausage, any canned meat, soups, vegetables and fruits. (These people cannot go to a food pantry for assistance as they do not have an address.)

Zachary Wilcox mentioned that they could also use tin cans, like popcorn or cookie tins, for keeping their dried foods fresh and away from Columbus wild life.

Another item he said they could use is umbrellas. Do you have any extras you aren't using or could you pick one/some at a discount store? The umbrella not only can protect from rains, but also can be used to block the wind.

When you bring in your items, they can be placed on the NSI table across from the mini kitchen. Remember to mark them with “LOAM” or “Mary” or “Camp” — something to distinguish these items from NSI.

Mary Wilbur can always use your help when she heads to the encampments. The group provides hot food in the winter and sandwiches in the summer for those they see. Think about joining the group one Sunday when they head out.

Your generosity of supplies and/or your time is greatly appreciated. Thank you!

Update from Zachary regarding shopping for the homeless.

Mary told him the group went out in January and had given away almost everything they took out with them. So Zachary volunteered to shop at Menards for propane canisters, listed at \$3.25. At the register, they rang up as \$2.72 so he picked up several more. His shopping list included canned goods and hot chocolate, items that he purchased with a gift card the ministry received.

With no end in sight to this cold weather, he asks that we keep these people in our prayers for warmth, strength, and safety.

Zachary finished his email with: “They will know we are Christians by our LOVE.”

Trustee Update: Plans for 2014

The Trustees first meeting of the year was held on January 16, and a bold agenda is set for 2014. There will be plenty of opportunities for you to help!

Projects we hope to complete or get under way this year:

- **Accessibility:** We are dedicated to completing three phases of our accessibility project this year. This includes building a new ramp at the entrance on the corner of Indianola and Maynard, installing a new lift for the stairs inside that entrance, and converting the bathroom next to the office into a single-person, accessible restroom. Adam Smith is in charge of the accessibility work.
- **Masonry repairs:** We have secured a loan from the conference and a grant from the district to help us get started on this project, and we are reviewing estimates for repairs to the bell tower, the northwest corner, and several other areas. We hope to get work started as soon as the weather turns, but we will need more money to complete the project. The Finance Team has come up with several fundraising ideas, and we appeal to you to support them any way you can.
- **Inventory:** The trustees are required to create an inventory of all church property this year. This will be a major project, requiring many teams to help. Shelli Hazel is in charge, so let her know if you are able to help.
- **Cleaning:** As we prepare for the inventory, we hope to clean

out the closets and storage areas throughout the church, sorting items to be saved, sold or discarded. This is another project that everyone can get involved in.

- **Security:** We will be performing a security audit of the church and the parsonage this year, and will explore various measures to ensure the property is more secure. Paul Wilbur is in charge of this project.

We also hope to assemble teams for an energy audit, church maintenance, grounds maintenance, and parsonage maintenance.

New officers and roles: During our first meeting, we elected our 2014 officers. Adam Smith is again serving as chair, Sandy Gaston as vice chair, and Dan Saneholtz as secretary. In addition, each trustee has been assigned a new role for the year. Those roles are:

- Accessibility supervisor: Adam Smith
- Building use supervisor: Dan Saneholtz
- Inventory supervisor: Shelli Hazel
- Parsonage supervisor: Sandy Gaston
- Security supervisor: Paul Wilbur
- Grounds supervisor: TBD
- Maintenance supervisor: TBD
- Energy supervisor: TBD


